## 'INCIDENT' IS NOW CLOSED

The "McClelland incident" at Warringah Shire Council is now closed.

Councillors on Monday held a closed session without reference to the story.

(Mr. McClelland is also manager of the Warringah, Manly and Mosman Joint Services Committee, which controls tipping.)

It was claimed the work was done without the authority of the council.

Subsequent events showed that the proposed access was the only one possible.

It was learned after Monday night's meeting that councillors were satisfied with certain assurances, and a simple motion closing the incident was agreed to.

Cr. R. J. Creagh later referred indirectly to the matter in open council.

He asked in what authority \$31,000 had been spent on the access.

The President, Cr. R. J. Legg, said this was by resolution of the council last year.

She is 1.3 metres tall, medium build, olive complexion, brown hair and brown eyes. She has a noticeable scar on her right ankle.

Katarina, Mary Burford, 16, was last seen after her mother at 7.30 a.m. on September 20 last year.

Her father told police he thought she was going to work.

Katarina worked as a shop assistant in a Blacktown store.

Mr. Burford said there had been no argument or domestic upset to cause her to leave home.

Katarina is described as 1.51 metres tall, solid build, fair hair and hazel eyes. It is not known what clothing she was wearing when she disappeared.

## RESCUE BOATS ROW ON AGENDA

Availability of power surf rescue boats is to be discussed by Warringah Shire Council next Monday night with the SLRA liaison committee.

This follows charges at last week's parks and recreation committee meeting of boats being used for "everything but rescue".

It was also stated the boats, one of which is subsidised by the council, were not always available for use by the council's beach inspectors.

The decision set aside a recommendation that the council spend \$150 on its own power boat.

Cr. E. E. Begond moved at this week's council meeting for the talks, with the council's beach superintendent, Mr. G. Mulline, also present.

He first moved for the talks to be with the committee, but agreed with Cr. F. M. Beckman for the matter to be listed for next Monday night's special council meeting.

Cr. C. S. Humbleton seconded the motion, which was agreed to without debate.

Cr. P. Conwell commented yesterday on statements he had made at the committee meeting in person entering the surf after the beach had been closed.

"My reference to the closing of beaches was in reference when the beach is closed by beach inspectors or surf club officials because of dangerous conditions."

"Individuals blatantly ignore signs and verbal warnings and still enter the surf, action should be taken against them."

"All too often lifeguards, at peril to their own lives, have to rescue young fools who take no notice of clear warnings and get into trouble in tumultuous seas."

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
